

Moravian Daily Texts



We have begun to use the Moravian Daily Texts to open Sunday worship, asking for volunteers to read each week. A number of teams are also using them during their meetings. Many folks are engaging in the texts in a consistent basis as we collectively listen to God, each other, and our community!

CrossTrekking with prL Wait! What! A Sabbatical?

Yes, friends, I am going on a mini-Sabbatical in June and July of this year. Now, before you balk or scratch your head trying to do the math, you are correct that I haven't been at Holy Cross for 6 years, the usual defined time of service expected before a rostered minister goes on Sabbatical. But this Sabbatical is different

First, it's MINI! I will be taking 6 weeks of intentional Sabbatical – a shorter period of time than the suggested 3-month Sabbaticals most people take.

Second, this mini-Sabbatical is funded through a Rocky Mountain Synod Phase 3 Lilly 3E Grant. These grants were first available to rostered leaders of RMS nearing the "end" of the pandemic to allow rostered leaders to take time for renewal from the long haul of the pandemic. Those first grants were gobbled up and there was no funding left when I applied in 2022. In the Fall of 2023, a third phase of grants became available to provide support and relief to rostered leaders so that we can continue to grow and thrive in ministry. I applied and was instantly approved.

Third, I was awarded through the RMS \$2000 for sabbatical related expenses at the same time the congregation was awarded \$2000 for leadership coverage to support the congregation while I'm away.

While I may have somewhat justified in your mind why I'm taking a mini-Sabbatical after only serving you for 16 months, let me tell you why I'm really excited to be going on a mini-Sabbatical:



I strongly believe a mini-Sabbatical fits into our VRSM process, and that is what I wrote in my grant application! I've worked with congregations as a Transition Coach and observed some distinct qualities and best practices that support a congregation to transition well. Those qualities focus on a strong lay-led congregation - A congregation that shares the ministry in partnership with the pastor. Early on in my call with you, I became acutely aware of your strength as a faith community to "do the work of the kingdom." You are enthusiastic ministry. You are eager to "become" whatever it is that God is calling us to. And you are listening to God, each other, and our community. Now is the time!

Leading up to the mini-Sabbatical, we will be working to put some things into place that will set us up well for this intentional time. Stay tuned during the next months as I will spell out in more detail what this time will look like for Holy Cross and what I will be doing. For now, let's keep listening to God for our next crosstrekking steps!

Listening to God

Where is God calling Holy Cross into ministry, we pause to reflect on and share our recent actions as a response to listening to God, each other, and the community. The past months have led us to engage in several "experiments," some of which began before we engaged in this process. They are listed here to observe collectively how the Holy Spirit has been working in and through us:

- <u>Immigrant Needs</u> We partnered with Lutheran Family Services to house a refugee family for one week. We will continue to explore ways to respond to the many needs of immigrants in our community.
- <u>Blessing Bags</u> This project is well underway and many ideas for expansion are in the works.
- Sharing our Building Space Although we have long offered our spaces to community groups, we have a building that is largely unused. How might God be calling us to use it in other ways?

<u>Listening to Each Other</u> <u>Care Ministry Workshops</u>

Sessions deal with Grief & Loss, Self-Care & Prayer, Listening Skill & Visitation, and Boundaries.

We are encouraging all those who care for others, those dealing with the death of a loved one, and congregation members who would like to learn how to be better prepared to care and love one another to join these sessions. You are welcome to come for the second session even if you haven't attended the first.

Transition Team 2023 Annual Report

This report was omitted from the Annual Report

Having completed the Holy Cross History and Congregational Core Values with Pastor Penni in 2022, the Transition Team, as part of the Vital Right Shaped Ministry process, looked toward the next steps of forming a Vision and Mission statement. Then the Holy Spirit intervened. Pastor Libbie joined us in February of 2023 and after reviewing what we had done so far, the Transition Team decided to transition into a new direction before working on our congregational Vision and Mission. We felt we had some work to do before we could create and define those statements.

In mid-April we had a Foundations Retreat with the HCLC church council and staff led by Tina Kvitek from the RM synod. Communication was a big take-away from that – and we pondered both technical changes – ways to communicate more effectively AND adaptive changes – ways to think about how we live together differently, through changing hearts and spirits. We took away that we have the opportunity to become the church who the world needs us to be...

From those take-aways we decided to focus on LISTENING – to God, and to each other, as well as to the community and world around us. What is God saying? What are we saying? What does the world need? Pastor Libbie shared the idea that we might "Grow DEEP first, then grow WIDE." What could it look like? Maybe we could start with reading scripture, sharing reflections, praying together. We decided to start reading the book - Leading Faithful INNOVATION: Following God into a Hopeful Future. AND we made a commitment to reading the Moravian Daily Texts – a short, daily scripture and prayer. In May we discussed how our daily practice was going – and we discerned that it was relevant, a daily focus, a reminder of God's presence and love, a connection to others at HCLC. Our next step was to figure out what we are called to do as witnesses to this radical love. And to invite others to join the MDT practice.

As we delved into the book, we pondered the idea of shifting from trying to "fix" what is wrong with the church, to "curiosity or wonder" about what God is up to, and calling us to do/be in the world. Instead of "How can we get more people to attend our worship service?" we could ask "What might God be up to in the lives of our neighbors?" The "WHY" of church/and our faith has not changed, but the "HOW" looks different. The three core practices of Faith Innovation include: to LISTEN (to God, to one another and to our neighbors.) To ACT (try something new based on God's leading) and to SHARE (reflect on our actions and share the story.)

As we were LISTENING, and encouraging others at HCLC to join us in the MDT listening practice, we were suddenly confronted with an opportunity to ACT – Lutheran Family Services was looking for a host family for a refugee family from South Sudan. The family had lived in a refugee camp in Kenya for 15 years before coming to the US. We have a facility here at Holy Cross – and some of the infrastructure already in place from Family Promise, to house a family, so we jumped in. Volunteers to be Kitchen Hosts and Overnight Hosts stepped up.

Of course there are many more neighbors who need support – people regularly come to our church with many needs – housing, food, clothing, shoes, bus passes. The Transition Team has pondered and discussed at length how to address those needs and what our next steps might be, as we continue to listen and reflect on what God is saying, and hear what our neighbors are needing. As 2023 comes to a close and we transition into 2024, we look forward to continued listening, acting and figuring out what we are called to do to be faithful witnesses to God's love in our lives... and in the process, begin to create our vision and mission statement!

President's Report

Holy Cross Council met for our monthly meeting on February 22, 2024. Arabella and Sharon England led devotions including the reading of the Daily Moravian Text.

Our new accountant Rory joined us via Zoom so that he could meet the Council. Tadd Overstreet presented an in-depth look at our finances and forecasts for the future. We began asking those God questions of where God is leading us as we look at our giving patterns. Did you know that our largest group of donors are folks over the age of 81? Way to go seniors!

We had an engaging discussion around Chapter 1 of Leading Faithful Innovations by Zscheile, Binder, Pinkstaff. This chapter looked at how churches have functioned in the past and what is facing us in the 21st century. Prior to 1960 people joined organizations to find belonging and purpose in the world. This was titled the Age of Association. Since the 60's people have looked inward to discover and express their true identities apart from organizations. This is known as the Age of Authenticity. Churches and most other civic organizations have seen a dramatic decline in membership as people find other ways to "do good" in the world apart from church. Just turn on your

TV and you will see many, many opportunities to give through GoFundMe, one-time volunteering, and much more. We as people of God, must find new ways to share the good news of Christ. Dream with us as we look for new opportunities to share God's love with our community.




